A) Introduction

Engagement is a key component of Canada's plan for the safe, long-term management of used nuclear fuel. For over 10 years, the Nuclear Waste Management Organization (NWMO) has engaged with potential host communities and the public to share Canada's plan. In what is known as the Adaptive Phased Management (APM) project, collaboration is a core value of the NWMO, and we are committed to ensuring that all interested and potentially affected individuals and organizations have their questions and concerns addressed, and their views heard and taken into account as the project moves forward.

The COVID-19 pandemic had a significant impact on the NWMO's activities over the past three years, creating unprecedented challenges to engagement. There were periods of time when public health measures required most staff to work from home, limited or prevented meetings and gatherings altogether, and closed our offices in Toronto – and for some time, our offices in the potential host communities. However, the NWMO ensured we remained present, virtually when necessary, as we adapted alongside the communities working to select a site for Canada's plan.

Despite the challenges of the pandemic, working in collaboration with siting area communities and following local health guidelines, we advanced the preliminary assessment phase of the site selection process over the past three years. This included NWMO staff and contractors meeting with municipal representatives, First Nation and Métis leaders, organizations and communities, key opinion leaders, community liaison committees and citizens to better understand the thoughts and concerns of people who wished to be engaged.

This document provides a non-exhaustive summary of the various engagement activities such as meetings, briefings, conferences and other events attended by the NWMO between 2020 and 2022. It describes the resources made available to communities, groups and organizations to ensure they are not out-of-pocket for participating in the dialogue. Also, it itemizes the many communication materials published to support engagement.

B) Working with First Nation and Métis peoples in the site selection process

During the last three years (2020-22), the NWMO continued to build sustainable relationships with First Nation and Métis peoples in and near the potential siting areas, while maintaining ongoing engagement with national, provincial and treaty Indigenous organizations. These engagement activities included over 24 separate groups or communities across Ontario and New Brunswick.

The NWMO also held a range of online activities with the Métis Nation of Ontario (MNO) during the pandemic, including environmental workshops, transportation engagement sessions and in-depth dialogue on the importance of water. In collaboration with MNO staff, the NWMO mapped out water sampling locations for a monitoring program conducted by the Métis, for the Métis, in the South Bruce area. Engagement with Indigenous communities in southern Ontario

In 2020, following the OPG deep geologic repository decision in 2019, the Saugeen Ojibway Nation (SON) was prepared to focus on more engagement with the NWMO. Discussions on engagement commenced between NWMO staff and SON Environment Office staff, but before any engagement started in the SON communities, the pandemic hit. While on travel restrictions, NWMO Indigenous Engagement staff and SON Environment Office staff held virtual meetings to discuss the NWMO's field activities and to develop a community engagement plan once travel resumed. The original information sharing agreement ended, and a new Protocol Agreement was put in place in August 2020. Staff from the SON Environment Office toured the first borehole site in October, and a ceremony was performed in November at the second borehole site.

In 2021, engagement consisted of virtual meetings between NWMO engagement staff and SON Environment Office staff. The SON Water Walkers performed a ceremony on-site in April. Once travel restrictions lifted, NWMO engagement staff started to hold weekly drop-in engagement sessions in each of the SON communities (Nawash First Nation and Saugeen First Nation). We participated in SON Proponents Day along with other proponents working in the SON territory and hosted the NWMO's Mobile Learn More Centre (MLMC) in each community in fall 2021. A SON monitor worked at the borehole site during the entire duration of drilling. We also provided the communities with masks and hand sanitizer to deal with the pandemic. We also held two or three virtual meetings with SON Nuclear Advisory Team and conducted three borehole site tours.

In 2022, we continued weekly community engagement sessions, and virtual home visits were initiated, holding approximately 12 visits in 2022. There were three visits in the community by the MLMC, and the NWMO participated in two SON proponents days. We also hosted one visit to the NWMO Discovery and Demonstration Centre in Oakville, Ont., and we also presented a project update at the SON Joint Council session in November. Other engagement activities included two movie screenings and a community bingo.

C) Working with interested communities in the site selection process

By January 2020, the NWMO had narrowed siting activities to two communities: Wabigoon Lake Ojibway Nation (WLON)-Ignace area in northwestern Ontario, and Saugeen Ojibway Nation (SON)-South Bruce area in southern Ontario. Throughout 2020 to 2022, the NWMO remained focused on moving towards partnership with municipal and Indigenous communities in these two remaining potential siting areas. NWMO staff were constantly engaging residents in Ignace, WLON, South Bruce, SON and surrounding communities through a collaboratively planned engagement program that included both virtual and in-person opportunities:

- Several open houses, open office events and drop-ins held in potential siting communities and their regional neighbours;
- Regular attendance and presentations at the community liaison committee (CLC) meetings;
- Formal and informal interviews with a cross-section of local residents;
- Assistance to CLCs in supporting events and newsletters;
- Preparation of written materials and informational videos;
- Participation at local and surrounding area community events, fairs, conferences and trade shows;
- Meetings with nearby First Nation and Métis organizations, and other communities;
- Attendance and presentations to local, area, regional and civil society organizations; and
- Learn More tours and presentations for residents of local communities and their regional neighbours.

In each of the communities, conversations begun at community meetings or open houses evolved into broader efforts to work with communities to involve a cross-section of community members, community groups, and local institutions and businesses. Discussions in each of the communities were held with:

- Leadership and senior staff at local, surrounding and regional communities;
- Members of the CLCs;
- Local business owners/operators;
- Local service providers (e.g., health, safety and emergency services, social services, and education);
- Local community and service groups (e.g., clubs, associations and organizations);
- Residents;
- Economic development agencies;
- Environmental and conservation organizations;
- Business and livelihood organizations (e.g., agriculture and chambers of commerce); and
- Local businesses, including tourist camps and others.

The topics of the conversations held in the 2020-22 period explored the confidence in safety of the project, the nature of field studies in the area, potential economic effects of the project, community studies, willingness and the community's long-term vision for the area. D) Municipal engagement

South Bruce area

Over the last three years, the South Bruce engagement team has continued to build relationships in the community and worked to showcase Canada's plan to contain and isolate used nuclear fuel in a deep geological repository. Engagement in the community aimed to explain the technical aspects of the project and share important socio-economic benefits. This proactive presence in the community provided the opportunity to support local events, ensure community members had an avenue to be heard and put people passionate about the safe, long-term management of used nuclear fuel out in front of the project and in the community.

Our team went to many community events, including fall fairs, festivals and sporting events. We sponsored community-driven projects and initiatives and worked closely with community leaders to understand related needs and interests. We invited the community into the newly renovated Teeswater office space and led tours of the South Bruce borehole sites.

NWMO staff attended and presented at numerous community liaison committee (CLC) and Municipality of South Bruce council meetings. We distributed newsletters and postcards, and published articles and advertisements in local media.

Our experts and scientists met local residents in person, for example, by attending coffee chats at local businesses, and were also available by phone. This work gave direct access to technical experts to answer questions in a detailed and unscripted way.

The South Bruce engagement team also strengthened local partnerships, especially with the Municipality of South Bruce. We listened to the community's needs as outlined in the 36 guiding principles and worked to address each one. For example, a Property Value Protection program was developed. The NWMO's response to the principles formed the basis of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the NWMO and the municipality, signed in 2022. This MOU provides a starting point to develop a hosting agreement.

In collaboration with the municipality, a number of socio-economic studies were undertaken. These studies provide a strong basis for understanding the potential impacts of the project should it come to South Bruce.

In June 2022, the NWMO brought our Mobile Learn More Centre (MLMC) to a Touch-a-truck event in Mildmay. This event gave the opportunity for families to learn about the project and ask questions directly to our scientists and experts. The event also provided the opportunity to promote near-term investment funding for a new pumper truck and trash compactor.

In October 2022, the South Bruce team hosted several events to provide the community the opportunity to review the updated renderings of the Centre of Expertise, speak with NWMO staff and provide feedback through a survey.

Outside the municipal boundaries, the team spoke to regional councils and communities. In August 2022, the team invited staff from Bruce County to an afternoon event to provide them with a presentation of the project and borehole samples, and the opportunity to speak directly to many NWMO experts.

Ignace area

Despite adversities such as the pandemic, forest fires, inclement weather and flooding, engagement activities and opportunities were carried out in northwestern Ontario. The team collaboratively worked to develop new engagement strategies such as the Get to know the NWMO campaign and increased use of community spaces around the region. Dialogues were held with key stakeholders about potential hosting agreement benefits, and a digital campaign to communicate potential project benefits was also launched.

Milestones achieved over the last three years were increased visibility and education efforts within the region, from Kenora to the Thunder Bay area. The NWMO hosted public Get to know the NWMO sessions with support from our subject matter experts who delivered detailed presentations, acted as guest speakers for the Dryden Monthly Learning Series, and participated in forums, symposiums and new regional events (Central Canada Resource Expo, Canadian Lakehead Exhibition). Additional educational efforts included the Mobile Learn More Centre (MLMC) touring the region, attendance at engagement events and staff supporting the Dryden satellite office. NWMO staff also engaged residents at open office and community events. Engagement also included fostering relationships with critical voices throughout the region.

The Township of Ignace received support from the NWMO to help complete its community studies and start the Centre of Expertise visioning exercises, which produced initial facility renderings.

Over the last three years, many important projects were completed despite the challenges. Youth engagement was increased through the development of day camps, held throughout the summer. The culminating youth activity event – The Youth Gathering – was a collaborative effort with the township, the Mary Berglund Community Health Centre and the NWMO in September 2022. This event featured speakers, community members and university graduate students from the Ontario Research Fund Project.

With provincial restrictions being lifted, the Ignace Learn More Centre re-opened its doors to continue providing learning opportunities to the public while also serving as facility open to use by the community. To further support sharing information about Canada's plan and answer questions from the public, a regional satellite office was opened in Dryden in October 2021.

Regional engagement and building and strengthening relationships were dedicated to the communities close to Ignace and the proposed deep geological repository site. Communities such as Wabigoon, Dymont, Long Lake, Dryden, Sioux Lookout, Vermilion Bay, Atikokan, Upsala and Thunder Bay had Get to know the NWMO events or the MLMC to enhance learning.

The NWMO continued to support the community not only to learn about the project, but also through contributing to community well-being. Through in-kind donations, we supported local initiatives, including the Christmas Cheer, the food bank and Teens in Motion. The NWMO also sponsored activities, including the Minor Ball Game and free public skating days. Through the sponsorships and donations program, local organizations received funding to contribute to activities and events such as our contributions to local and regional businesses to make hand sanitizer and distribute it across the region during the pandemic.

Partnership

The NWMO continues to work with siting and regional communities to build towards sustainable and resilient partnerships to support the future implementation of the project. Over the course of 2020 to 2022, the NWMO advanced our partnership road map through the establishment of several agreements, working groups and protocols with both host and regional communities. These initiatives were not only aligned to community values and principles, but also guided by key NWMO values of safety, community well-being and long-term sustainability. The establishment of these initial agreements, working groups and protocols were key steps in advancing dialogue on partnership.

Borehole drilling

Borehole drilling, coring and testing is a major part of the geoscience work carried out in both the Wabigoon Lake Ojibway Nation (WLON)-Ignace area and the Saugeen Ojibway Nation (SON)-South Bruce area. This work is part of the NWMO's broader site investigations to enhance our knowledge about the potential siting areas.

Borehole tours

Borehole tours were an important step towards facilitating the public's understanding of the project and the NWMO's high commitment to safety through in-person experiences.

Wabigoon Lake Ojibway Nation-Ignace area

After four years, our borehole drilling activity in the WLON-Ignace area was completed. A total of six one-kilometre-long boreholes were drilled in the Revell Batholith rock formation, located south of Highway 17, about 35 kilometres west of Ignace, between Ignace and WLON.

Community monitors from WLON were on-site during the borehole drilling, and they were an important part of the team. They provided input on-site, and they also went back and shared information and insights with WLON to have a better understanding of the work happening at the borehole sites.

Borehole site tours that took place included students, residents and people from the region. Participants travelled with NWMO staff to the borehole site to learn more about the borehole work being conducted and also visited the seismic and meteorological station.

In 2020 and 2021, the NWMO co-developed with each of the Township of Ignace and the Municipality of South Bruce their own youth engagement strategies. Working groups identified youth engagement challenges, opportunities and goals. The collaborative result was youth-developed strategies that encourage positive participation, capacity building and mutual learning while fostering community opportunities for youth engagement, skills training and sharing of ideas. These strategies will continue to foster open dialogue, and working sessions will continue to prioritize youth voices and enable youth leaders to:

- Provide youth with meaningful opportunities for learning, understanding and involvement in their community;
- Provide opportunities for youth to learn about, participate in and provide feedback on the NWMO and the APM project;
- Build capacity through investments in training and education;
- Identify a network of resources that will facilitate and support youth-led voices; and
- Provide multiple engagement pathways that can sustain fun and engaging events and activities.

Community liaison committee (CLC) youth members

Resources programs – The NWMO Learn More Program

In 2009, the NWMO created a Learn More Program to provide funding to those communities, organizations and individuals seeking assistance in learning more about the NWMO and APM project. The NWMO has committed to ensuring that communities have the resources they need to participate in the siting process and to not be out-of-pocket for their participation.

Throughout the site selection process, additional resources have been made available with the intent of:

- More broadly and deeply involving community members in learning;
- Building and strengthening relationships with nearby First Nation and Métis communities;
- Engaging with neighbouring communities to discuss how the project may best fit in the area, and be implemented in a way that addresses the priorities, needs and sensitivities of community members; and
- Making investments in the well-being of communities while participating in advanced studies.

For 2020-22, resources available to support interested communities' participation in the siting process include:

- **Funding for administrative expenses associated with co-ordinating community Learn More activities:** This may include costs associated with dedicated support staff, administrative expenses for a community working group, and expenses of existing staff related to the NWMO process.
- **Funding to participate in conferences, learning events and workshops:** Funding to cover participation in learning events, dialogues and workshops organized by the NWMO, as well as conferences that bring together researchers, implementers, regulators and/or other specialists to share information in this area.
- **Community youth initiatives and youth engagement:** The NWMO covers costs associated with involvement of youth in community learning and decision-making.
- **Community strategic planning activities:** Funding to develop and/or augment existing long-term strategic plans in order to support their further consideration of the project.
- **Support for visits to interim storage facility for community representatives:** The NWMO covers travel expenses for representatives in communities involved in the site selection process to visit an interim waste storage facility in Ontario or other nearby facility.
- **Funding to support future community decision-making,** including access to third-party training/skills development and advice to represent community interests in discussions with the NWMO.

- **Funding to support shared learning and shared planning initiatives in the area**, including marketing/research studies to examine the impacts of relocating trades/professionals to the community, tourism development, business expansion, and retention.
- **Community Well-Being Reserve Funds.** The NWMO makes an annual financial contribution to the Community Well-Being Reserve Funds of communities in advanced studies and their significant neighbours. Administered by the community, these funds are intended to support the community's continuing efforts to build community sustainability and well-being, to support capacity-building to participate in discussions to explore partnership with the NWMO, and to host the project in the future through the development of transferable skills. The financial contribution is made to the Community Well-Being Reserve Funds established for this purpose or to a similar mechanism. Communities provide a report to the NWMO on use of the funds on an annual basis. This reporting is accessible to community members upon request and to the municipality or First Nation community. This approach is consistent with the NWMO's commitment to ensuring transparency and good governance.
- The **Near-Term Investments in Community Social and Physical Infrastructure Projects** complements other Learn More resource programs and offers funding to communities for eligible near-term social and physical infrastructure investment projects as they move into more intensive phases of study in the site selection process. Eligible First Nation communities and municipalities that are interested in participating in this program are invited to submit a business case for near-term investment projects they want to implement. The NWMO will review individual proposals based on the following considerations: 1. Broad benefit; 2. Sustainability; 3. Benefits are clear and reasonable; 4. Project is achievable; 5. Alternative funding; and 6. Future costs are managed.
- **Early Investments in Education and Skills (EIES):** Funding is provided to support specific initiatives that build community capacity to participate in the APM project long term, as well as to develop transferable skills that may be used in other workplaces and projects. Support is provided for youth programs and community members via funding for various STEM initiatives, as well as for general skills development, training programs and education assistance.
- **Sponsorships and donations:** Funding is available to support a wide variety of local and regional initiatives in areas such as education, environment, cultural initiatives and youth sports.

E) Working with municipal associations in nuclear provinces

Throughout 2020 to 2022, the NWMO continued to involve municipal associations in the four nuclear fuel cycle provinces in learning about the implementation of Canada's plan and has sought their advice on engaging with communities.

Municipal Forum

In 2009, with the co-operation of 18 senior leaders from provincial and municipal associations and the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, the NWMO hosted the first meeting of the Municipal Forum. With their collective experience in both rural and urban municipal affairs across the nuclear fuel cycle provinces, forum members provide valuable insight into communicating and working with local municipalities. Members also facilitate an effective link to the municipal associations and their membership, which includes hundreds of municipal governments.

For most of the period 2020-22, the forum suspended in-person meetings and met virtually, and continued to act as a conduit for insight on best practices for working with local governments and acting as a link to municipal associations and their members. The forum's members helped the NWMO better understand the needs and processes of municipalities. They provided advice towards approaches to partnership, hosting agreements and engagement activities appropriate to municipalities and regions surrounding siting areas.
